

Nine for IX Films: Let Them Wear Towels

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What kinds of barriers (individual, family, organizational/structural, societal) have women sports writers faced in trying to enter or work in the sports media? Use social theory to explain why there are still so few women employed in the sports media industry.
- 2. The locker room is a place of work for sport journalists. In 1990 *Boston Herald* sports reporter Lisa Olson was sexually harassed and humiliated in the locker room of the New England Patriots. Why has women's presence in men's locker room been so resisted and debated? Using Michael Messner's (1990) concept of "contested terrain" discuss why women's presence in men's locker rooms was/is threatening to some men?
- 3. Who were some of the pioneering sports media women in the 1970's interviewed in the film? Who are some of the well-known female sport media columnists, writers, broadcasters, and editors today?
- 4. With the passage of Title IX in 1972 which lead to a record number of girls and women participating in sport, how did this growing interest of sportswomen affect the number of women in sport journalism? What other social movements were occurring in the 1970's that influenced large numbers of women moving into the workplace?
- 5. Can you think of other workplaces in which women were, or currently are, denied access to a crucial space in which they do their work?
- 6. Can you think of examples in other sports where the Key Concepts listed at the beginning of this guide are present?
